





# Improving Family Child Care Sustainability

Targeted Funding Helps Providers Remain Open—Especially Effective for Spanish-Speaking Providers

Family Child Care and Beyond: Exploring Targeted Investments in Child Care Program Sustainability and Workforce Development in Rhode Island is a research project led by a partnership between Education Development Center (EDC) and Rhode Island's Department of Human Services (DHS). The project examines targeted supports designed to promote program sustainability and workforce development among family child care (FCC) providers, particularly those serving families who participate in the Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP).

From October 2021 to February 2022, Rhode Island's DHS administered the **ReInvigorate Child Care Stabilization Grant** program. This grant opportunity, funded through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021, offered funds to licensed child care providers to help stabilize their business operations and to ensure that they could continue providing safe care during the COVID-19 pandemic. Family child care providers received between \$12,000 and \$18,000 (depending on program size). The majority (90%) of FCC providers received a stabilization grant.



#### **Urban Core**

Three quarters (75%) of stabilization grant recipients were located in the urban core<sup>1</sup> compared to 46% of non-recipients.

### **Accept CCAP**

91% of stabilization grant recipients accept CCAP compared to 62% of those who did not receive a grant.

### Spanish Speaking

Three quarters (74%) of stabilization grant recipients were Spanish speaking compared to 39% of those who did not receive a grant



## **FCC Recipients of Stabilization Grants**





Stabilization grants were especially helpful for Spanish speaking FCC providers. While these providers were more likely to close than other FCC providers, receiving a stabilization grant substantially reduced the risk of closure. The effect of stabilization grants on an FCC provider's ability to remain open was most pronounced for Spanish speaking providers.

"If I had not received these funds I would have lost my home. Thanks to these funds I can keep my home and open my daycare again. Without these funds nothing would be right for our families." —Stabilization Grant Recipient
